		Participants are collected from the meeting area by the toilets, carpark and café. Participants	
		are encouraged to go to the toilets and wash their hands before heading to the battlefield.	
		Activity groups under Covid19 restrictions agree that at least one adult must remain on-site to	
		help children/participants maintain safety measures during breaks. This applies to Family	
		bubbles (closed bubbles), socially distanced bubbles (open bubbles) and socially distanced	
		groups.	
		Participants will be provide red with hand sanitiser before entering the briefing area.	
		The briefing area and activity bases have been made bigger to offer ample room for	
		participants to social distance. This will be demonstrated and regularly mentioned throughout	
		the participants experience.	
		Guns will be laid out on the floor to mark where participants need to stand. The guns will be	
		spread out so social distancing is achieved.	
		Each participant will use 1 gun for the whole of their session and will be encouraged only to	
		touch things they need to.	
		After each session the used guns will be cleaned with a Milton sterilising fluid solution and	
		have a clean hand band added.	
		Used hand bands will be washed in a washing machine on a boil wash before used again.	
Completed by		The instructor will carry a mask and gloves to be able to administer first aid.	
		After the session has finished the instructor will recommend that all participants wash their	
		hands in the toilets.
